How the IAG Works/What is the IAG?

The Interest Advisory Group is a fairly small committee (usually less than 10 members and is a dynamic and fast moving working session that blends the role of the public and media together to help drive citizen-affected issues forward. The IAG's members will provide input on the study plans, be updated on progress/results, and review and comment on final reports and recommendations.

Before the conference gets underway, IAG members will have been assigned two to four categories that they wish to represent. (These are included in this document) In representing this outlet, it is particularly vital that members mirror the viewpoint as identically as possible. Members will be required to briefly read through all committee background guides in order to complete preliminary research. Keep in mind that during the course of the conference many new developments may occur, it may be required to represent a brand new character on the fly!

There will also be positions for four delegates as journalists during the conference. They will sit in on committee sessions, interview key roles and write articles for *Focus on IJC*. Stories will be submitted in Microsoft Word format via an email address given to journalists on the first day of the conference. Submissions via USB keys will also be accepted.



With the exception of the first day of conference, the IAG will be producing two editions of *Focus on IJC* per day. Because distributing *Focus on IJC* is no easy task, the editing team will ask journalists to volunteer to help get the paper around once it is finished being pressed.

Required Materials and Expectations

Members are welcome to bring laptop computers, but they're not necessary. The Delegate services room (or a specified IAG lab) will have computers for use, and paper and pen are the usual on-the-job tools when going from committee to committee. Delegates are encouraged to prepare powerpoints for their presentations to committees as well.

At the start of each day at the conference, we'll have a sheet in the IAG committee room that shows all of the active committees at the conference. Assignments will be made based on reports and discussions occurring within the committees themselves. Members are expected to stimulate debate within the committees by introducing strong arguments and persuading the committee members of your cause.

The IAG supervisor/Editor-In-Chief is there to not only turn stories into *Focus on IJC* but to assist IAG members with questions or comments that they may have. The New York Times --The world famous, internationally distributed New York Times daily newspaper has been a staple of American journalism since its rise to fame in 1870. While battling constant criticism for sometimes giving too much information and at other times giving too little; The New York Times continues to provide us with an interesting and truly American perspective of the world.

The Daily Freeman is a seven-day-a-week morning newspaper in Kingston, New York, the Ulster County seat. Serving all of Ulster County and parts of three other counties in the Mid-Hudson Valley, the broadsheet publication has a weekday circulation of approximately 22,000. Freeman reporters were recognized by the New York State Associated Press Association in 2005 for coverage of a shooting at the Hudson Valley Mall Feb. 13 of that year and for a series of articles on severe flooding that occurred the following month.

The Gulf of Maine Times, a project of the Gulf of Maine Council's Public Education and Participation Committee, is made possible through support of the Gulf of Maine Council on the Marine Environment and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The Gulf of Maine Council on the Marine Environment was established in 1989 by the governments of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire and Massachusetts to foster cooperative actions within the Gulf watershed. Its mission is to maintain and enhance environmental quality in the Gulf of Maine to allow for sustainable resource use by existing and future generations.

The Globe and Mail is the largest circulating national newspaper in Canada and second largest English circulating newspaper. It initiated as *The Globe* by Canada's Liberal-thinking Father of Confederation, George Brown. In 1936, *The Globe* then merged with *The Mail and Empire* which was founded by Canada's first Prime Minister of Canada, Conservative Party politician Sir John A. Macdonald. *The Globe and Mail* is now regarded as a newspaper that holds a relatively centrist political perspective. Website: <http://www.theglobeandmail.com/>

The Hamilton Spectator was first published July 15, 1846, and since that date has been the voice of Hamilton and the surrounding area. Originally named *The Hamilton Spectator and Journal of Commerce*, the paper was founded by Robert Smiley and a partner, and was eventually sold in 1877 to William Southam, founder of the Southam newspaper chain. The Spectator was the first newspaper in the group, which grew from a single property to become a significant media voice in Canada for more than 100 years.

Standard Freeholder has been the newspaper of record for Cornwall and the counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry since 1846. The Cornwall Standard Freeholder is one of the oldest newspapers in Canada. In 2006, the Standard-Freeholder was nominated for the first time for a National Newspaper Award for a series of articles published the day after an announcement the city's oldest and most prominent employer, Domtar Fine Papers Inc., would be shutting down its paper mill operation for good.
